Harveys Lake Borough Joins Back Mountain Community Partnership

Harveys Lake Borough recently became a member of the Back Mountain Community Partnership (BMCP).

Harveys Lake Borough is the 7th member municipality in the BMCP which also includes Dallas Boro, Dallas Twp., Franklin Twp., Jackson Twp., Lehman Twp. and Kingston Twp. The BMCP was formed to serve the needs of the Back Mountain region of Luzerne County and provide communication, cooperation, and joint action in the interest of local governments of the Back Mountain region individually and collectively.

In 2008, State Senator Lisa

Baker, in cooperation with Misericordia University and the Northeastern Pennsylvania Alliance (NEPA), provided the impetus for the formation of the BMCP. NEPA has been the administrator of the BMCP since its inception. The BMCP has worked cooperatively on a number of projects to improve the Back Mountain community including the new Back Mountain Regional EMA Building on Route 118 in Dallas.

In order for Harveys Lake Borough to join the Partnership, the Borough had to petition the BMCP for membership. Each of the BMCP municipalities passed a resolution in support of Harveys Lake Boro's membership in the BMCP. Harveys Lake Boro's membership was confirmed at the November 20th BMCP meeting. The BMCP meets monthly at the Back Mountain Regional EMA Building.

New District Boundaries in Effect, Boback Says

In Pennsylvania, the redistricting process takes place every 10 years. During this process, each of the 203 House and 50 Senate seats are examined and adjusted to make sure they reflect the current distribution of the Commonwealth's population. Boback's district had previously included portions of Columbia, Luzerne and Wyoming counties.

The new 117th Legislative District includes part of Lackawanna County consisting of the townships of Benton, La Plume and West Abington and the borough of Dalton; part of Luzerne County consisting of the townships of Dallas, Fairmount, Franklin, Hunlock, Lake, Lehman and Ross, and the boroughs of Dallas and Harveys Lake along with all of Wyoming County.

Boback's district office locations remain unchanged. Her office in Tunkhannock is located at 608 Hunter Highway, in Suite 110. The office can be reached at (570) 836-4777. Boback's office in Dallas is located at 1108 Twin Stacks Drive and can be reached at (570) 675-6000.

Services available at the district offices include: Driver's license and vehicle registration applications and renewals. Assistance with PennDOT paperwork (lost cards, changes, corrections, special registration plates, farm plates and exemption stickers, vanity plates and placards for disabled persons). Assistance regarding birth certificates. PACE and PACENET applications for seniors. Property Tax and Rent Rebate applications. State tax forms. Farm plate and exemption stickers. Dallas Borough Winter Parking

Please be reminded of the following winter parking and snow removal regulations for Dallas Borough:

It is the duty of the owner, tenant or occupant of any property in Dallas Borough to clear the entire width of the sidewalks contiguous thereto of all snow or ice within twenty-four (24) hours after the cessation of any storm or fall of snow.

It is unlawful to deposit any snow or ice on a road or immediately next to a fire hydrant.

It is unlawful for a vehicle to stand or park in any Borough roadway which interferes with the snow plowing or ice removal.

It is unlawful to be parked on a Borough road during or following a measurable snowfall of one inch or more. Parking on Borough roads is prohibited for a period of three (3) days following a snow accumulation for the purpose of clearing snow and ice. Vehicles not removed from streets or roadways will be ticketed and towed at the owner's expense.

Anytime Fitness, a recently opened gym in Dallas, is everything its name implies. "We're open 24/7, 7 days a week," said Steve Sherwood, owner of the local franchise. "Anytime you want to use the fitness center, you can. The place is never, never closed."

Anytime Fitness is located in the Country Club Shopping Center on Route 309. It occupies the space at the far end of the shopping center that has been vacant for three years. The large, open floor space is loaded with new, state-of-the-art equipment including treadmills, ellipticals, and exercise cycles. Each and every one has its own video screen where you can watch TV, listen to Pandora, or go online.

"Gone are the days when people had to line up in front of their TV to exercise," said Steve. "Here, you can just walk in and plug your set of headphones right in.

Each client has a key and they can set goals for any given time period. Then, whenever they comein, they can log on to check their progress and their history. Anytime Fitness has free weights, and top of the line Precor plate-loaded weight machines. Precor has been designing and manufacturing fitness equipment with a focus on ergonomic motion for nearly 30 years. The weights are independent so you can actually load more on one side if that is how you want to work out.

"Being 24/7, we have a lot of built-in safety in these machines. There are stops in place to prevent the weight bars from coming all the way down. The Precor machines have a lot of integrated safety features," said Sherwood, a former Army major with the Field Artillery. "I like this business because it's people helping people just like the Army."

Anytime Fitness in Dallas is one of 2700 locations around the world. Members have access to all of those gyms so it is also a great option for people who travel. The biggest draw, though, is that it is always open. So, no matter what your work schedule is, you can get to the gym.



Misericordia University social work students examine issues of rural poverty during area tour and visit to Pastor's Food Pantry in Noxen



Students in the Social Work Club at Misericordia University are teaming up with social work students from Alvernia University in Reading, Pa., and in Nepal as part of the Sahayogi Connections international service-learning project. The collaborative international exchange project is designed to expand their understanding of international social work practice by having them first examine social work practices in their local community. One of the first stages of the project for the Misericordia students was a tour of both affluent and impoverished neighborhoods in and around the rural community. A visit to the Pastor's Food Pantry that is affiliated with the Noxen United Methodist Church. The pantry's director, Pearl Race, conducted the tour. As much as 9.2 percent of the population of Noxen Township, Wyoming County, and nearly 20 percent under the age of 18, are living below the federally established poverty line, according to Race. Because of the need, the food pantry serves an average of 60 to 80 families per month from Noxen and surrounding communities. "I did not know such poverty existed in this area, and that there is such a gap between the wealthy and those in poverty in the same area," said Olivia Paone, Toms River, N.J., a member of the executive committee of the Social Work Club. "With all the need that there is, I can't believe that the pantry is as small as it is and is located in the basement of the pastor's house. Now that I have seen it, I definitely want to come back to help."


